FOOD TOXINS AND YOUR PETS

What to look out for this Easter

Easter is an exciting chance for the family to spend some time together, and while our doors will be open all weekend long we hope you have a safe and fun long weekend.

Even though this time of year normally means hot cross buns, Easter eggs and lots of other delicious treats, it isn't a time to share those around with your pets. It can actually be quite dangerous.

Here's a couple of things to look out for over the Easter season.

- Raisins: Although they are tasty to us.. especially in hot cross bun form lathered in melted butter! Never give them as a treat to your pet as eating these can lead to acute kidney failure is likely.
- Chocolate: Contains caffeine and a chemical called theobromine – both are dangerous to cats and dogs. Never let your pet ingest chocolate, as it can cause heart disturbances and seizure activity.
